

Maeve Houlihan is a lecturer in Organisational Behaviour and Management with UCD Business Schools, University College Dublin, Ireland. Her undergraduate training in Industrial Relations and Human Resources at the University of Limerick led to HR jobs in manufacturing and services. Following a Masters in Organisation Studies, and lecturing in UCD (1993-1996), Maeve undertook doctoral studies at Lancaster University's Department of Organisation, Work and Technology, before returning to UCD in 2000. Maeve coordinates the Masters in



Management and Organisation Studies at the Smurfit School of Business, leads the undergraduate OB teaching team, and works closely with UCD's MA in Arts Management and Cultural Policy.
